AFA LOSES A GREAT LEADER

The Air Force Association has lost a great leader and friend. Former AFA President and Chairman of the Board, **Martin H. "Marty" Harris**, passed away on December 9, 2016 at the age of 84. He was born in Brooklyn NY on March 14, 1932. After graduating from NYU with a degree in engineering he joined the Air Force. He fulfilled his career in the Air Force Reserve retiring with the rank of Colonel.



Marty worked over forty years for Martin Marietta/ Lockheed Martin retiring in 1997. He was named president of numerous companies that dealt with international sales. As a result, he traveled all over the world meeting people and making new friends.

Marty has often been referred to as "Mr. AFA," and rightly so. The Central Florida Chapter was chartered on August 8, 1963 with Wilfred Hardy as president and Marty as vice president. Within two months of taking office Wilfred died and Marty became president. Air Force Association (Florida) was chartered November 21, 1964 with Marty as its first president. He went on to serve on the Board of AFA becoming National Secretary, National President, and Chairman of the Board. Upon leaving that

position, in October 1988, the Secretary of the Air Force presented Marty the Exceptional Service Award for his service as Chairman. He continued to serve on the Board as a Director Emeritus.

Marty led AFA at its peak of membership and at a time the Air Force needed AFA support. His leadership style included guiding and motivating up and coming AFA leaders.

Typical of the thoughts and comments from those who knew him are: "THE model of AFA Chairmanship. He was gracious, focused on building AFA in its finest hours, tough when he had to be, always generous and supporting, and a REAL leader with a super sense of humor. He made working hard in AFA "fun." "Truly a leader whose qualities we all need to emulate." "Great statesman, mentor and friend." "One of the best men I have ever known." "Totally aviation focused, a leader, teacher, mentor, friend and icon."

Marty received virtually every award in AFA including Member of the Year for 1972. He was also proud of receiving the Gen. Lewis H. Brereton Award from AFA (Florida). A couple of his most cherished accomplishments were being a major player in the building of the Air Force Memorial in Washington, DC and the establishment of the Air Warfare Symposium and Air Force Gala in Orlando.

In 1972, the Commander in Chief, Strategic Air Command, General Bruce Holloway, held a seminar at McCoy AFB. Marty was the civilian project officer for that visit. That later gave him the idea to bring industry to Orlando in the winter time to discuss the needs of Tactical Air Command, a primary customer of Martin Marietta. As AFA's President and Chairman of the Board, Marty



was in a prime position to make that happen. In January 1985 AFA held its first Tactical Air Warfare Symposium in Orlando. In support of this, the Central Florida Chapter held its first Air Force Gala. Thirty-three years later they are still going.

As an engineer in the Air Force, Marty had some interesting jobs. One of the stories he liked to tell about his days on active duty was his opportunity to get a flight in the experimental YB-52. That was the version that had the copilot sitting directly behind the pilot as in the B-47 and two seat fighters. A one of a kind! That made the flight in this aircraft even more memorable. Before production, Gen. LeMay had the cockpit seating changed to side by side as was normal for bombers.

A widower (Patricia deceased 2008), Marty is survived by daughters Lori Harris of St. Petersburg, FL; Barbara (Jeffery) Mathews of Maitland, FL; grandchildren, Brittany Johnson, Gwendolyn Nicholas, Erin Nicholas, Joanna Mathews; great grandchildren. Cameron and Jaxson.

Martin H. Harris was a husband, father, grandfather, great grandfather, airman, engineer, corporate executive, organizational leader, mentor, counselor, adviser, friend, neighbor and sometimes just "Marty."

Life presents us with ups and downs. Most of us handle the ups pretty well. It's the downs that tell our true character. Marty Harris showed us how to live both with ease.

God bless you, Marty.

Science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) programs continue to make news in Florida education. Two examples are right here in central Florida! One from UCF (including our own **Todd Freece**, Central Florida Chapter Executive Vice President) and one from Polk State Chain of Lakes Collegiate High School (where **Dr. Suzanne Halverson** is our Teacher of the Year).

FIRST Robotics Competition...

Todd Freece, an AFA volunteer, recently helped judge the Orlando Regional FIRST Robotics Competition. The event is the oldest in Florida, one of the most veteran in the nation, and is an international favorite. This spirited competition started in 1999 at Kennedy Space Center. With its

rapid growth to 72 teams, this competition has now moved to the University of Central Florida Arena. Competition is keen with teams from Canada, Germany, Australia, Brazil, Puerto Pico Dominican

worked diligently on multiple research topics. Recently, they focused on the

Verizon App Challenge with a focus on some key medical science areas: conservation of energy, athletic injuries, and awareness of mental illnesses. Additionally, on a second track, STEM scholars at Polk are constructing two remotely operated underwater vehicles (ROVs), with the final competition slated for early in 2017. STEM scholars are also investigating the integration of the GoPro technology to increase the quality of medical education.

Polk Education Grant...

The STEM Enhancement Program was awarded a 2017 Polk Education Foundation Grant. The funds will be used to continue and support STEM scholars (mentors), elementary school students, and middle school students with life skills needed to be successful in a future STEM career. The STEM scholars are blaz-

ing new paths as they organize a collaborative effort. A key goal is to both complete the robotic technology construction rapidly while also mentoring young STEM participants.

Funding from the Polk grant will supply six Lego Education "WeDo" Core Sets and six LEGO MINDSTORMS EV3 kits, which the STEM Scholars will use to help younger children learn to use critical thinking skills to engineer various types of robots. The knowledge gained from the STEM Enhancement workshops will encourage all STEM participants to choose a STEM discipline and a STEM related lifetime occupation. Lastly,



POW-MIA

Force Association (AFA) Daily Report, the AFA highlighted the recovery of Major Troy Gilbert's remains from Iraq where he died in action in November 2006. He was flying an F-16, strafing the enemy to protect U.S. Special Forces troops who were under fire. He was unable to gain altitude in sufficient time to save his own life. In the meantime, he had saved the lives of the fighters on the ground.

His body was taken by enemy fighters. However, skull fragments were found in the aircraft and the authorities concluded he died on impact. After almost 10 years, his body, flight suit, flight jacket, and parachute harness were recovered and brought home. These were turned over by an Iraqi tribal leader.

A memorial service for **Major** Troy L. Gilbert was held at Arlington National Cemetery on Dec. 19, 2016, at 1 p.m. (see the November edition of Air Force Magazine)

How are such remains recovered?

Formerly the Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command, the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency's (DPAA) mission is to provide the fullest possible accounting of U.S. personnel who lost their lives during

In a recent edition of the Air past conflicts and bring closure to their families. Their site (www.dpaa. mil) details on-going work to find and return remains from our nation's conflicts. They are still recovering remains from World War II, the Korean War, and Vietnam. They can accomplish this because of cooperation of the government in the country (or other leaders in country such as in Major Gilbert's case) in which the remains are located. They receive eve witness accounts, excavate sites, and match DNA to determine from whom the remains came. Then the remains are recovered and brought home to the families of the Missing in Action.

The National Park Service, Andersonville, web site (www.nps.gov) provides statistics on Prisoners of War. There are currently no American Prisoners of War, but clearly. over time, this has affected family and friends throughout our country.
