CyberPatriot X is off and running. Registration is now closed, resulting in 5,584 registered teams as we begin the tenth season of the National Youth Cyber Defense Competition. This is a 26 percent increase from the 2016-2017 competition year.

Teams registered represent all 50 states, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, the U.S. Department of Defense (DOD) schools in Europe and the Pacific, Canada, Australia

Happy New Year! **Susan** and I extend our sincere wish for a happy, prosperous and safe 2018 for all of our members. We ask the Lord for his wisdom this year and protection of our Airmen (Active, Reserve, National Guard and Civilian) as they serve this great nation at home and abroad. We also ask for healing and understanding for those still experiencing the physical and mental wounds of service.

As I look back upon 2017, I am amazed by what this Chapter has accomplished. We began the year with our Chapter's Golf Tournament, raising five thousand dollars for Airmen and Family Programs. We hosted the Gala at the 2017 Air Warfare Symposium where we presented five AFA Fellowship awards to some truly outstanding airmen – including a former Chief of Staff, General Jumper. We hosted the 2017 Winter Meeting for AFA Florida State. In March we conducted the Air Force Scholarship Opportunity Program to introduce young men and women of character to opportunities to pay for their college tuition en route to becoming Air Force officers. We worked with our school districts to identify and select a Teacher of the Year for outstanding contributions to STEM programs and contributed hundreds of hours toward STEM program support in the form of hours in support of STEM presentations in the classroom, CyberPatriot, and StellarXplorers. We represented our local Air Force Veterans at the Orlando Veterans Day Parade and honored the top local Air Force Recruiter of the Year at our Holiday Party. Funds raised from Chapter events provided support to veterans who need transportation to the VA hospital in Orlando, funding for JROTC, Civil Air Patrol, and AF-ROTC cadet programs and scholarships for individual cadets participating in the University of Central Florida AFROTC program. Your contributions of time, talent and treasure make a difference. **Because of YOU the AFA mission is alive in Central Florida!**

As we step forward into 2018, ... "things are a changin'!" The most significant change is the absence of the Gala in 2018. AFA National leaders asked us to suspend the Gala for the 2018 Air Warfare Symposium (AWS) in response to pressure from Industry for a less formal (and perhaps a less costly) event. The Chapter will not host a Gala at the 2018 AWS. We are still pursuing an Awards Event so that we may continue honoring the contributions of our Airmen and Industry supporting a powerful national defense. We will continue with the Golf Tourney to raise funds for the Chapter and various AFA national missions. Our objective is to continue the legacy of our namesake, **Martin H. Harris**, to honor our Airmen and contribute to the AFA mission at large while raising funds to support the AFA mission here in Central Florida. We are working with AFA National leaders to continue profit sharing from the AWS to support the local mission. The Chapter initiated the AWS in 1985 and expects to continue sharing in the profits from the program after over 33 years of success.

Change is opportunity. It is an opportunity to further define the role of the field within the Air Force Association, and an impetus for the Chapter to explore new avenues for fulfilling our local mission. There are challenges ahead. I am certain that our membership has the ideas and energy to succeed. 2018 is a year of transition. You are the people I want on my team. Life holds many challenges for each of us. It is important to remember that making the most of these challenges and learning from every experience will help us become the best leaders we can be.

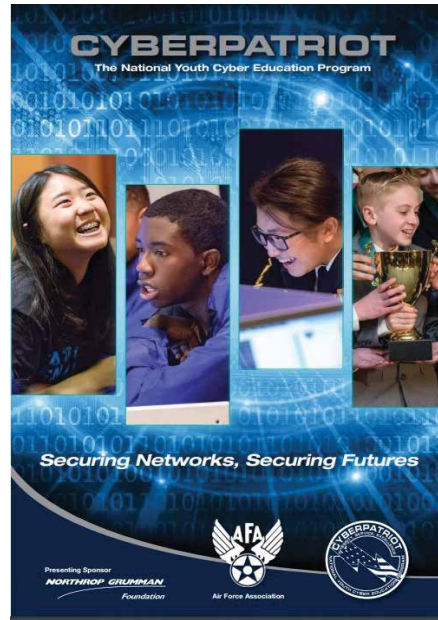

A Conundrum To Be Sure...

Our President just completed a tour of the Asian continent where he talked largely about trade. The economic instrument of national power was the topic of the day. Rather than multi-national agreements, the President favors one-to-one trade agreements stating he "won't allow the U.S. to be taken advantage of anymore." The President's view is that trade deficits are bad and the U.S. needs to be treated more fairly. Some politicians believe that Mr. Trump's stance on trade will inhibit the broader relationships that were enjoyed in multi-lateral trade agreements basically shutting out the U.S. as these agreements are made among the countries that we no longer want to deal with as a group but with

This reminds me of the national election in 1992 when the phrase was coined, "it's the economy, stupid." NOW, we are looking at a national debt of over 20 trillion and our Congress

cannot agree on a budget, it's probably still the economy, stupid. Obviously, Mr. Trump thinks he's doing the right thing and many agreed with his stance as they voted for him knowing he intended to put America first.

I'm not an economist, but, it gives me pause that we seem to be attempt-

ing to turn back time and ignore the idea that we have a global economy.

At the same time this is going on, Mr. Trump is courting China asking them to engage North Korea using the diplomatic instrument of power. China suggested the U.S. stop conducting exercises in the region and North Korea freeze its nuclear program. Nothing less than a non-nuclear North Korea is acceptable U.S. policy.

The President also authorized deployment of the 3 aircraft carriers to patrol adjacent to Korean waters and joint Navy and Air Force training off Okinawa in a show of force using the military instrument of power. alition military power. Specifically, the US European Command (EUCOM) and US Pacific Command (PACOM) regions require an increased allocation of global intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance (ISR) assets to meet these requirements. The US and its partners must prepare for theater access challenges, and policymakers must also give greater attention to nuclear deterrence and planning." 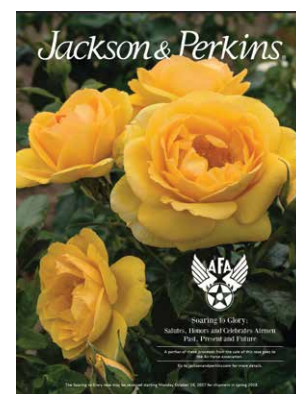
